LEARNING ACTIVITIES SUCCESS CRITERIA

I can write a biography with key dates of an emigrant from Scotland

- Identify someone in your family, or from your village/ town, who emigrated.
- Find out why they went, where they went, and when.
- See if you can find them on any passenger lists or emigration records available on the internet.
- Research and read some first hand accounts of emigration voyages.
- Write an imaginary diary of their journey.

I can show on a map the main countries round the world where Scots emigrants settled

- Research where Scots emigrants settled at various times in Scottish history.
- Find out why they left Scotland at these times.
- Show on a world map where they went and trace the routes the emigrant ships would have taken.
- Find out if their descendants still remember their links with Scotland and how they celebrate these links.

I can research the story of famous Scottish emigrants and make a presentation about them to my class

- Find out about famous Scots who went overseas.
- Choose one famous Scot and research their life and achievements.
- Present your finding in a powerpoint presentation.
